A particular sadness because this is the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the village memorial.

The memorial was placed on a building which was built originally as a school and post office.

In 1896-7 the building was converted into Public Halls.

The war memorial was erected 1920 by James A Morris, dedicated to the fallen of the First World War.

The additional small square stone memorial set at the ground level was dedicated to those who fell in the 1939 -1945 war.

While we are not able to gather with the uniformed organisations, it should not stop us remembering and honouring the generations who gave so much to guarantee our freedom.

Remembering the courage of those who went before seems to me all the more important this year!

Especially now we do well to recall that our generation was not the only one tried and tested.

For previous generations their testing time often brought out the best in them.

Materially they had far less than we do. Spiritually perhaps they had more?

This year marks the eightieth anniversary of a pivotal moment in the Second World War.

Eighty years ago, the people of many cities including Coventry, London, Liverpool, Glasgow were living in terror!

To many it must have seemed like the beginning of the end of the world as the Luftwaffe bombs rained down.

In Aug 1940, the Battle of Britain was infamously described by Winston Churchill

"... never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

Today we remember and give thanks to God for the courage and endurance of our fathers, mothers, grandfathers, grandmothers who stood firm despite the cost.

Let us pray that future generations look back at our conduct through our testing time with similar admiration and gratitude.

In closing another profound quote from one of our finest prime ministers


"Success is not final; failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts." Winston Churchill.

A note from David...

I must begin this note by expressing my heartfelt thanks to my APC family for all your kind words, messages, cards and gifts given to me on the occasion of my ordination as an Ordained Local Minister - thank you all so much!! I was absolutely overwhelmed by how many people took the time to express in different ways their support, friendship and love.

Those who attended, or watched my service of ordination may remember Rev. Neil referring to a remarkable lady called Edith Egar and her book 'The Choice' - I just had to read it.

A native of Hungary, Edith Eger was just a teenager in 1944 when she experienced one of the worst evils the human race has ever known. As a Jew living in Nazioccupied Eastern Europe, she and her family were sent to Auschwitz, the heinous death camp. Hours after her parents were sent to the gas chamber, the "Angel of Death," Nazi officer Dr. Josef Mengele, forced Edith to dance for his amusement - and her survival. Edith's bravery however kept her and her sister alive. Toward the end of the war Edith and other prisoners were moved to Austria. On May 4, 1945 a young American soldier noticed Edith's hand moving slightly amongst a number of dead bodies. He quickly summoned medical help and brought her back from the brink of death.

In her book, Edith recounts how throughout her imprisonment and in the years since her liberation, there

have been innumerable occasions where the choices she made had a huge impact on her life - at times making the difference between life and death. Choices are important!

We too have choices to make in our life, and very often these are not easy choices to make. Our faith however is hugely important in guiding our choices, as is the support and love of our Christian brothers and sisters. Let us seek to keep the message of loving our neighbour at the centre of the choices that we make.

On a lighter note...

As an Ordained Local Minister I am fully aware that I still have much to learn. I did not expect however, that as a minister that I would need to learn how to choose my wardrobe so carefully. A few people who watched the recorded service on Sunday 25th October commented that I looked like 'Father Ted'. Despite wearing a navy pinstripe suit, and a matching navy clerical collar, I did look like the 'man in black' - and actually not too unlike Father Ted. Saint Andrew



The apostle Andrew (d. c.60) is Patron Saint of Scotland. According to the gospel of Matthew, Andrew and his brother Simon Peter were the very first two disciples whom Jesus called. 'Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.' (Matt 4:18,19)

Without more ado, they obeyed. 'At once they left their nets and followed him.' The story is touching for the simple but total faith that they had in Jesus.

Whenever the gospels mention the disciples, Andrew's name is always in the first four. Rather than a boisterous leader of men (like Peter), he seems to have been an approachable person who wanted to help people.

It was Andrew who helped introduce a group of Greeks to Jesus (John 12:20-2) and Andrew who offered Jesus the five small barley loaves and two small fishes when Jesus challenged them to feed the five thousand. (John 6:8) His faith in Jesus over small things was richly rewarded, and this faithful, kindly Galilean fisherman turned disciple went on to become one of the 12 apostles of the Christian Church.

Andrew never settled back in Capernaum by Galilee. Instead, his 'fishing for men' seems to have taken him far. One ancient tradition links him with Greece, where both Scythia and Epirus claimed him as their apostle. Another place in Greece, Patras in Achaia, claimed to be the place where Andrew was eventually martyred.

Like Jesus, he was crucified, but the story goes that during the two days it took him to die, he preached earnestly to the people about Jesus. Andrew was not afraid of death on a cross - he had seen it before, and knew one thing for certain: because of Jesus, there was nothing but eternal life ahead of him.

In the West, Andrew's feast-day was universal from the 6th century, and hundreds of churches were named after him in Italy, France and England. But how did he end up as patron saint of Scotland?

Well, according to one ancient legend, some of his relics were taken from Patras to Scotland in the 8th century, and ended up in Fife, where a church dedicated to him was built and became a centre for evangelisation and later pilgrimage.

As Andrew was the only apostle to make it as far as Scotland, he was chosen as patron saint.

11th November Martin of Tours

This winter, when you next see someone who looks both poor and cold, think of Martin of Tours. This monk bishop, born in Pannonia (now Hungary) became one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages.

Martin's father was a pagan officer in the Roman Army, and Martin was intended for the army as well. But from an early age Martin wanted to be a Christian and felt that as a Christian he could not serve the Roman Empire. Martin was imprisoned for this early 'conscientious objection', and not released until 357, when he was nearly 40.

One day Martin met a nearly naked beggar at Amiens. He took off his cloak, cut it in half and gave the half to the beggar. Soon after this, he had a dream in which Christ appeared to him, wearing the half of the cloak which Martin had given away.

Martin was the pioneer of western monasticism: he founded the first monastery in the whole of Gaul about 360. He was made bishop of Tours in 372 - by popular demand of both his clergy and his people.

As bishop, Martin continued his simple life as a monk, - and evangelist. Christianity had been largely confined to the urban centres of population, but Martin went further, and took Christianity to the pagani (countrymen). For the next 25 years this greatly loved bishop travelled his diocese by donkey and by boat, preaching the good news of Jesus Christ, and helping his people to tear down their heathen temples and sacred trees. He was sought out for his healing prayers for the sick, and also his defence of the faith from heretics.


